

#### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The Walter L. Fish Jr. House, at 15 Fiske Hill Road, is a one and a half story single family dwelling, representative of the late nineteenth to mid-twentieth century change from agricultural to residential growth and development in the Fiske Hill Road area of Sturbridge. This residence is three bays wide by three bays deep, with a rectangular plan and a front gable, asphalt shingle roof with overhanging eaves and eave returns at the gable ends. The foundation appears to be painted concrete blocks, the exterior is clapboard and there is wood and aluminum trim on the visible main façade and side exteriors. Windows are replacements of the originals and are generally 6/6.

The main, eastern facing façade has concrete steps which lead to a one story projecting gabled vestibule, with overhanging eaves, eave returns and corner boards similar to the main portion of the residence. The first story has paired 6/6 windows to the south of the entry and a single, 6/6 window to the west of the entry. A second story 6/6 window is set within the gable. The northern side exterior of this portion of the building has two visible 6/6 windows and a secondary entrance.

A one story, cross gable portico connecter is between the residence and a one and a half story gambrel roof outbuilding with exterior clapboard and wood trim to include corner boards. There is a double garage door and what appears to be a havloft door set within the gambrel and two. 1/1 windows on the northern side exterior.

The southern side exterior has three, paired, 6/6 windows and exterior wood stairs which lead to a deck at the rear, southwestern corner of the building.

#### HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

Fiske Hill refers to the "first permanent European agricultural settlement after circa 1725" which was established in the Eastern Upland area of Sturbridge. In 1731, brothers Henry and Daniel Fiske settled on the hill, prior to the 1738 incorporation of the town of Sturbridge. These men and their descendants "were important not only on the hill as farmers and founders of the Baptist church there, but also in town government and, by the 1800s, in industrial enterprises in Globe Village, Westville, and Fiskdale."<sup>2</sup> Fertile soil made this area ideal for agriculture and by the late eighteenth century, Fiske Hill had also developed as a stagecoach road with a Baptist Meeting House, School, and Inn. By the early to mid-twentieth century, development shifted from agricultural towards higher-end residential growth.




Figure 1: 1898, showing that the western side of Fiske Hill Road was not developed by the late nineteenth century and showing property across Fisk Hill owned by "Simson"

This building could have been related to buildings noted on an 1898 map, across Fiske Hill Road from property owned by the Simson family. (Figure 1)

The parcel was originally part of a larger property and early deeds reference it as "the Newell Place." In 1912, the property was transferred from Canadian immigrants, Augustine Simpson, (ca. 1876-1911) and his mother, Philomene Simpson (born ca.

1840) to John B. L'Homme (born 1872) and Georgianna Simpson L'Homme (born 1870), who married in 1893. In the 1920s through the late 1930s. John was employed with the American Optical Company and the L'Hommes lived on Mechanic Street, in Southbridge.5




Figure 2: 1919 Plan showing Lot 323, referred to on deed

By 1919, Fiske Hill resident Otis Leach (1865-1940) held mortgages for the land of farmer, (and brother of Augustine and Georgianna Simpson L'Homme) Napoleon Simpson (born ca. 1871) and his wife, Georgiana Raymond Simpson (born ca. 1871) who had married in 1908. 6 (Figure 2)

In 1944, Maggie J. Leach (1888-1973), wife of Otis, sold land with buildings on the "new location of Fiske Hill Road and this property is noted to be "a portion of the premises" conveyed by that deed."

Salesman and town selectman Walter L. Fish, Jr. (1914- 2005) and his wife, Marion S. Fish (1914-1991), were residents of this house on Fiske Hill Road by 1949. They sold the property in 1966. 10




Figure 3: 1931 Plan of Fiske Hill, showing Napoleon & Georgianna Simpson property
