

#### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community. The Berthiaume House is a Tudor Revival style house of one-and-a-half stories. The main block has a side gable roof with a transverse gable in the south façade. The transverse gable has a sharply pitched roof that extends on one (west) side to accommodate an entry in Tudor Revival style. On the main block's façade adjacent to the projecting transverse gable is an unusual, fixed, 40-light window with diamond patterned muntins. The house lot slopes down to the west slightly allowing a two-bay, flat roofed garage to be attached to the house at basement level. The main entry on the facade through the transverse gable has a Colonial Revival surround with an arched pediment. In the gable field of this section of the house is an arched window with leaded glass. On the east elevation of the main block is a one-story wing under a hipped roof. The Tudor Revival style was one of the more common styles for the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century for suburban homes. While the style could be elaborate and architecturally complicated, this simpler form was popular because its basic plan and elevation could be given stylistic distinction with a few features such as the entry in the extended roof of the transverse gable and a few windows with decorative effect.

### HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Etienette and Alfred Berthiaume were Southbridge residents when they bought the land on which this house was built in 1937. They had been married in 1931 and soon after that, Etienette changed her name to Stephenette, a translation from the French. Alfred was a postman. The Berthiaumes were among the most stable households in Sturbridge. Stephenette was a gardener and attended the Brimfield Garden Club in 1960 to speak about Christmas decorations. At his death in 1970 Alfred had retired, but he and Stephenette still lived in the house. She remained in the house selling half ownership in 1997 to Yvette Lassonde who worked in Southbridge at American Optical. Stephenette died in 1998 after more than a six decade long occupancy.
