

**Setting:** On northwestern bank of Alum Pond, near the intersection of Paradise Lane with South Paradise Lane. Residential building faces northwest along Paradise, with the water to the southeast.

### **ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:**

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community. The Alva L. Burroughs House, at 68 Paradise Lane, is an example of an early nineteenth century recreational cottage, loosely related to Colonial Revival style and constructed along Alum Pond in Sturbridge. This one and a half story high single family dwelling has a clapboard and wood shingle exterior and wood trim, and a front gable asphalt shingle roof with a minimal eave overhang. It appears to be raised on concrete footings with a small crawl space beneath, with stones set in to block some of the opening. It is three bays wide by three bays deep with a rectangular plan. There is an exterior, stone chimney on the northeastern facing elevation.

The northwestern façade, along Paradise Lane, has a shed roof, enclosed entry ell with a paneled door divided into six upper lights, and a single one light window to the left of the entry. The main section of the building on this façade has a one story 1/1 window and, within the upper half story, there is what appears to be a casement window, with each side divided into eight lights.

The northeastern side elevation has a first story, 1/1 window, as well as the prominent, exterior stone chimney. The southwestern side elevation has a single window on this side of the enclosed entry ell, as well as two, 1/1 windows on the exterior of the main section of the building. The crawl space beneath the building, as well as stones which fill in some of the opening, can be seen from this perspective. There is also another shed roof section off of the waterfront, southeastern elevation, which is not easily visible from Paradise Lane and appears to be enclosed with plastic sheeting.

#### HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

A late nineteenth century map shows that this section of Alum Pond was not yet developed at that time period. (Figure 1) The area was already utilized for recreation as, "Fed by springs, its clear water abounding in fish, the salubrity of the air and the romantic scenery has given the shores of this pond a local reputation as a camping ground."<sup>1</sup>

By 1929, this property is Lot #44, known as Glendale by the Lake, Big Alum Lake, noted to be connected to Hampden Countybased real estate developer Julius Ewig (1884-1940).<sup>2 3</sup> (Figure 2)

Springfield residents, George T. Lemis (born ca. 1883) and Irene B. Lemis (1890-1955), and Robert B. Cowles (born ca. 1895) and Marion W. Cowles (born ca.1894), owned this property until 1944. It is unknown if there was a building on the site at that time as it is not mentioned in the deed.<sup>4</sup>

Alva L. Burroughs (1899-1954) and his wife, Bertha M. Burroughs (1902-1989), of Springfield, were owners of this property by 1944.<sup>5</sup> Alva was a World War I veteran and machine shop apprentice Foreman at the Springfield Armory at the time of his death, and had been employed there for 20 years.<sup>6</sup>




Figure 1: Area is undeveloped by 1898 - arrow shows future location of 68 Paradise Lane
