#### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The Samuel Thompson House, at 531 Route 15, is an example of a single family dwelling which was constructed between the mid-to late nineteenth century, with later alterations, and provides evidence of the residential and agricultural growth and development near Leadmine Pond in Sturbridge. This building is seven bays wide by two bays deep with a north/south aligned rectangular plan. It is one and a half stories high with a stone foundation, vinyl siding, and some wood trim. It has a side gabled, asphalt shingle roof with overhanging eaves and eave returns on the gable ends. There is an interior chimney set slightly off-center along the roof ridge.

The main, eastern facing façade has stone on the lower half of a shed roof enclosed addition which runs the length of this elevation. There are steps which lead to a paneled door with nine upper lights and there are three, 6/6 windows on either side of the entry, for a total of six windows. A cross gable wing with an east/west aligned rectangular plan is off of the western rear elevation.

A north/south aligned rectangular plan outbuilding, identified as a garage, is four bays wide and has a side gable, asphalt shingle roof and is positioned to the southwest of the main residence. The exterior is clapboard with wood trim. Four windows on the eastern elevation are each 6/6.

### **HISTORICAL NARRATIVE**

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.




Figure 1: 1857 Map, Samuel Thompson property

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


Figure 2: 1870 Samuel L. and Ruth C. Thompson property

This property was connected to the Thompson family from at least the mid-nineteenth century through the late twentieth century. Preliminary deed research found that an early owner was farmer Samuel Thompson (1783-1869), who was married to Dolly S. Thompson (1781-1854). (Figure 1) In 1869, the property was passed on to their son, farmer Samuel L. Thompson (1824-1893) and their daughter, Ruth C. Thompson (1818-1887) who had both been living with their father since at least 1865. At the time, Ruth was working as a teacher. (Figures 1 and 2)

The land was later divided into two tracts and in 1891, the "farm with buildings" was passed on to Sarah E. Thompson (1858-1933), wife of Samuel R. Thompson (1854-1919), (married in 1877), and then a second tract was added in 1892. Samuel R. was the son of Daniel C. Thompson (1814-1888) and Amanda E. Thompson (1818-1891), and was Samuel and Dolly's grandson and Samuel L. and Ruth C.'s nephew. (Figure 2) The rear, east/west aligned ell may have been constructed by 1898. (Figure 3) Barn outbuildings are also shown on the 1898 map, which may be related to the current garage. (Photo 2, Figure 3)

Farmer Wilse Willey Hubbell (1881-1942) and his wife Amanda E. Hubbell (1891-1971) were the next residents. Amanda was a daughter of Sarah E. and Samuel R. Thompson. The property was later passed on through Amanda's estate, through their daughter, book keeper Eunice M. Hubbell (1912-1954).

Wilse and Amanda's younger daughter, Doris E Barrett (1912-2005), owned the house up until the early 1990s.<sup>7</sup>




Figure 3: 1898 Map (Samuel R. Thompson) showing property and barns, which have a different configuration than the current garage outbuilding, but may be related.
