JOSHUA LOREN BOOTII MAY 20, 1983 – OCTOBER 17, 2006

First Lt. Joshua Loren Booth was born May 20, 1983, in Virginia Beach, son of John Edwin "Jack" Booth and Debra Lynne Guell Booth of Sturbridge, Mass. The family moved to Sturbridge in 1990. Josh attended Burgess Elementary School, Tantasqua Jr. High School, and was a 2001 graduate of St. John's High School in Shrewsbury, Mass., where he was on the soccer, football, wrestling and track teams. In 2005 he graduated from The Citadel Military College of South Carolina in Charleston, S.C., where he earned a degree in criminal justice and was a high-scoring member of the pistol team. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps in May of 2005. He then attended TBS, followed by Infantry Officer School in Quantico and was subsequently stationed at the Marine Corps Base in Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii. He was 3rd Platoon leader in Echo Company, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, which was deployed to the AI Anbar Province, Iraq in September of 2006. He died Tuesday, Oct. 17, 2006, of combat injuries received while on active duty in Haditha. He was commissioned a first lieutenant posthumously.

Josh was a devoted husband and father, a loving son, brother, and uncle, and a proud officer who loved his country and was devoted to his Marines. He leaves his wife, Erica Rust Booth, a daughter, Grace Mackenna Booth, and an unborn son, Tristan Joshua Booth. In addition to his wife, children and parents, 1st Lt. Booth is survived by his sister, Melissa Long DeVera and her husband, Michael, of Fredericksburg; grandparents, Loren James Hanson Guell of Independence, Ohio, and James Edwin "Ed" Booth of Virginia Beach and Bedford; uncles and aunts, retired Col. USMC William Fitzpatrick "Rick" Booth, and his wife, Karen, of Fredericksburg, Blackburn Jordan Booth and his wife, Linda, of Virginia Beach, Robert Blackburn Booth of Greensboro, N.C., David Hanson Guell of St. Cloud, Fla., and Amelia Grace Guell of Independence; nieces and nephews, Nicholas Kyle, Noelle Debra, and Isabella Lauren DeVera, all of Fredericksburg; and cousins, 2nd Lt. William Fitzpatrick Booth Jr., USAF, Thomas Paul Booth of Fredericksburg and Edwin Stuart Booth of Norfolk. His grandmothers, Betty Rogers Guell and Peggy Gentry Booth, preceded him in death.

Eagle, Globe, and Anchor

The Marine Corps emblem is the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor or EGA. Adopted in its present form in 1868, it derives partially from ornaments worn by the Continental Marines and the British Royal Marines, and is usually topped with a ribbon reading "Semper Fidelis". The eagle stands for a proud country, the globe signifies global service, and the fouled anchor signifies maritime traditions. The eagle is a crested eagle found worldwide, not the bald eagle that appears in other American symbols and is native to North America only. The eagle is standing on the western hemisphere and is holding a scroll with the Marine Corps motto, Semper Fidelis, on it. It is inscribed with gold letters, "Department of the Navy, United States Marine Corps".

The EGA is worn on the Cover of Marines and also on the their uniforms. Normally, during the ritual an EGA is placed on the chest of the deceased veteran at the wake. All active duty Marines who are killed in action or deceased are buried in their uniforms that have the EGA. In the case of Josh, who has already been buried and his family has been presented flags, the parents and widow will be presented with an EGA Cap Ornament as a symbol of the Corps after the ritual.

The rifle, helmet and boots represent a fallen soldier killed or missing in action. The helmet signifies the fallen soldier; the inverted rifle represents a break in the action to pay tribute; and the boots represent the final march into battle.

Gold Star Mothers

Shortly after World War I the Gold Star Mothers Club was formed in the United States to provide support for mothers that lost sons or daughters in the war. The name came from the custom of families of servicemen hanging a banner called a Service Flag in the window of their homes. The Service Flag had a star for each family member in the military. Living servicemen were represented by a Blue Star, and those who had lost their lives were represented by a gold star. Gold Star Mothers are often politically and socially active. Today, membership in the Gold Star Mothers is open to any American woman who has lost a son or daughter in service to the United States.

Sturbridge honors its Gold Star Mothers from WWII in a memorial located in front of the Center School Building, across from Town Hall. Gold Star Mothers Day is celebrated on the last Sunday in September.
