

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

The <u>David and Rebecca Atherton House (ca. 1842, STU.131)</u> is a south-facing, altered Greek Revival-style, two-and-one-halfstory, wood-frame building with a three-bay, side-hall plan and a two-story ell extending from the east elevation. A large, westfacing, two-story, seven-bay-by-one-bay addition built in 1972 is connected to the ell by a two-and-one-half-story hyphen on the north elevation. The house and ell have a slate-shingled, cross-gable roof; the addition has an asphalt-shingled, side-gable roof. The walls of the entire building are clad in vinyl siding. The main house has a stone and parged foundation, while the addition has a concrete foundation. A recessed entrance in the south (facade) elevation of the house contains a four-panel, two-light door with sidelights. A two-story porch spans the west elevation of the hyphen and shelters a secondary entrance. A gable-roof entrance porch with vinyl-clad walls shelters the main entrance to the addition in the central bay of the west elevation. It contains a six-paneled door with sidelights. Fenestration in the original house consists of six-over-six, double-hung wood sash, while fenestration in the addition consists of one-over-one, double-hung aluminum sash.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

The <u>David and Rebecca Atherton House (ca. 1842, STU.131</u>) is at the east edge of the village of Fiskdale in the town of Sturbridge. Sturbridge was settled ca. 1725 by residents of Medfield and was incorporated as a town in 1738 (MHC 1984:3–4).

The house first appears on the 1857 Walling map as the property of Rebecca Atherton (1784–1867), widow of David Atherton (1788–1849). David Atherton married Rebecca Abell in 1812 in Rehoboth, Massachusetts, where they were both born. David Atherton was a machinist and one of the owners of the first cotton factory, established about 1815, in the village of Westville in Southbridge. Atherton was also a signer of the 1814 petition for Southbridge to be created out of portions of Dudley, Charlton, and Sturbridge (Plimpton 1882:36). The couple likely moved to Fiskdale ca. 1842, when their daughter, Rebecca C. Atherton (1818–1892), purchased the subject property from Calvin Shepard, presumably on behalf of her parents for the purpose of building a house (WCRD 366/514).

Rebecca C. Atherton married Daniel Adams, a farmer from nearby Brookfield, in 1860 and transferred the subject property to her mother (Ancestry.com 2011; WCRD 632/424). When her mother died in 1867, she inherited the property, described as having a dwelling house and barn, and sold it to her stepson, Eliakim Adams (WCRD 752/246). In 1880, Eliakim, who ran a saw and grist mill, lived at the property with his wife Lucinda and daughter Helen. His son Charles W. Adams, who worked at a saw mill, also resided at the property with his wife Emma, daughter Ada, and son Clarence. The property remained in the Adams family until 1942, passing from Eliakim to Charles, from Charles to Ada, and finally from Ada to her husband Frederick (Beers 1870; Richards 1898; WCRD 2870/42).

The property changed hands five times between 1942 and 1971. In 1972, a two-and-one-half-story addition containing six apartments was constructed, likely for the RS Flynn Realty Corporation (WCRD 5098/547). After the construction of the apartments, the property again changed hands repeatedly, nine times between 1971 and 1993. In 1993, the Southbridge Savings Bank, which had acquired the property through foreclosure, sold it to the current owner Gregory Cormier (WCRD 15502/97, 15792/44). A beauty salon occupied one unit of the building but is now closed.
