

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

The Wheaton Knight House (1857–1870, STU.144) is a south-facing, Italianate-style, two-and-one-half-story, three-bay, wood-frame building with a one-story, two-bay-by-two-bay, addition enclosing the southeast corner of the house and a one-story ell projecting from the north elevation. The house has a brick foundation, a bracketed end-gable roof, and wood clapboard walls with corner boards and cornice returns. The addition has a flat roof and wood-shingled walls. The roof is pierced by two chimneys. A bay window in the west bay of the south (facade) elevation has paired carved brackets below its roof. The main entrance is in the facade elevation of the flat-roof addition, has a wood surround with fluted pilasters and a dentiled cornice, and is filled with a six-panel door. An arched opening in the gable peak has a one-over-two, wood window, and the second story of the facade has three two-over-two, wood windows. Other fenestration consists of replacement one-over-one and four-over-four, vinyl sash.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

The Wheaton Knight House (1857–1870, STU.144) is near the center of the village of Fiskdale in the town of Sturbridge. Sturbridge was settled ca. 1725 by residents of Medfield and was incorporated as a town in 1738 (MHC 1984:3–4).

The subject property first appears on the 1870 Beers map as part of a larger property owned by blacksmith Wheaton T. Knight (1815–1874) (Beers 1870). Knight was born in Providence, Rhode Island, and married Sabra Ann Stebbins Lumbard (1821–1888) in Brimfield in 1837. Sabra Lumbard Knight was a cousin of Maria Lumbard Bates (see Emory L. Bates House, 502 Main Street (STU.130). In 1870, Knight resided in Sturbridge with his wife Sabra and their daughter Ella (US Census 1870). The Knights had five children: William, Hosea, Frank, Ella, and Wheaton E. L. Only Ella and Wheaton reached adulthood, and only Wheaton outlived his father, dying two years later than him (Find A Grave 2014). By 1898, the property was owned by John B. Day, a painter, who lived with his wife Alice and their son John (Richards 1898; US Census 1870). No deeds have been found to determine when Day acquired the property. Deed research does indicate that the property was likely owned by George and Albert Sikes in 1871 and by William Kirby in 1890 (WCRD 836/536, 1326/354).

In 1900, William Kirby (1862–1913) transferred to his brother James (1867–1927) one-half of a lot of land he owned on the north side of Main Street in Fiskdale, likely the subject property. The Kirbys also owned the adjacent Kirby Drug Store (see <u>Josiah J. Fiske Building, 552 Main Street, STU.145)</u>. In 1932, James Kirby's land was transferred to his heirs, Ernest, James, Mary, and Kathryn Kirby, who subsequently sold it to Delphis and Exina Chauvin (WCRD 2565/57, 2577/45). It was likely during the Chauvins' ownership that an attached barn and a free-standing outbuilding at the north end of the property were demolished (Sanborn 1911–1948). In 1959, Delphis and Exina's son Raymond inherited the property, keeping it for ten years before selling it to Clarence and Beatrice Robida (WCRD 4016/542, 4971/549). For the remainder of the twentieth century, the property changed hands frequently until it was purchased by its current owner, Wetherbee and Wetherbee, LLC, in 2005 (WCRD 35469/200). Today the property is mixed-use, with a store and a residence occupying the building.
